Special Award in Environmental Studies

This award is presented each year to a single high school exhibitor in either of the Earth & Environmental Sciences or Environmental Engineering exhibit categories whose project shows ambition, sound understanding of scientific principles, adherence to the scientific method, and, ideally, intersects with the Chapter's mission and/or the nature of our members' professional work.

The KCHMM award includes a stipend which has grown over the years to \$500, of which \$200 is funded by the Chapter treasury and the balance is funded by Chapter members' out-of-pocket contributions collected at Chapter meetings throughout the year.

Kaden Grant, a 9th grader at Ballard High School, received a \$500 stipend from KCHMM as an award for his work in the LRSEF. Legislative and Regulatory Update



Federal Actions

Uncertainty continues to reign on the jurisdictional extent of Waters of the United States or "WOTUS." The Clean Water Act prohibits discharge of pollutants to navigable waters, which Congress defined simply as "waters of the United States." The definition of this term is important because it determines when a permit is required whether for Section 402 discharges (KPDES permits) or Section 404 dredge and fill permits. The absence of a precise statutory definition of WOTUS has led to decades of litigation with multiple cases before the United States Supreme Court.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency under President Obama established the most recent regulatory WOTUS definition by final rule on June 29, 2015 (80 Fed. Reg. 37,054). Numerous entities, including 31 states and several environmental advocates and industry organizations, immediately challenged this "2015 Rule" in multiple courts across the country. The Supreme Court decided that the federal District Courts have jurisdiction over challenges to the rule. Some District Courts stayed application of the 2015 Rule while substantive challenges make their way through the courts. By these decisions, at this time twenty-two states are covered by the 2015 while the other twenty-eight are covered by the 2008-vintage predecessor rule and guidance documents. (See the map below). EPA and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers released a pre-publication of the revised definition on December 11, 2018. A public comment period will follow publication in the Federal Register.

Jurisdictional decisions in Kentucky and the other "green" states fall under the pre-2015 regulations and guidance.



KCHMM PRESENTS **DOT Hazardous Materials** 8-hr Advanced Update Course Friday, March 22, 2019 8:30 AM - 5:00 PMUniversity of Louisville Shelby-Hurst Campus

By request from the KCHMM membership, KCHMM is teaming with Environmental Compliance Source LLC to bring you an informative and economical DOT HazMat Shipper Update Course. Jennifer James Koenig, a fellow CHMM, will be your instructor for the day.

This is an 8 hr. course designed to meet the recurrent training requirements in 49 CFR 172.704. This course will be targeted to professionals whose job is directly related to the shipment of hazardous materials and/or training of such individuals. This is an advanced course targeted for those requiring recurrent training and will review the basics as well as discuss recent DOT changes in regulations. While we will not reject any students who have never had the DOT HAZMAT course before, this will be a very challenging venue in which to learn brand new material at the advanced level. So, beware of bringing brand new hazmat employees to this course. ECS does offer entry level and HazMat shipper specific courses in a separate venue.

This course is designed for the advanced HAZMAT Employer or Employee and ideally suited to those with duties as in-house trainer. This course will not only prepare students for their hands-on duties as a hazmat employee but also with the reference tools and resources to train, verify new shipping requirements and more. Course materials include the HazMat Publishing DOT Compliance Manual (with Emergency Response Guidebook). Practice/exercises will be conducted and a written test given at the end. A verbal test is also available upon advanced request. Please note that some of these materials are in small fonts so bring your reading glasses if you need them!

In the spirit of being eco-friendly, we will be offering the presentation via download prior to the class so students can bring their own laptops and tablets for the presentation. We will have some hand-outs but hope to minimize printed materials. A printed manual is available upon request.

Modal specific information is targeted primarily for highway transportation. Some rail information will also be reviewed. Please note that modal transport via air and ocean vessel will NOT be covered in this course other than general information as it relates to the Hazardous Materials Table.

Information about your trainer: Jennifer James Koenig has been teaching DOT HAZMAT for 25 years and has a unique way of conveying difficult training materials as well as offering suggestions on training techniques for you to use within your own organizations.
